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The Force of Collective Courage: Unhooking Narratives to Link Hope, Purpose, and Achievement

11:00 AM – 12:15 PM | Location: Smith 305

At Bentley University, we are called to **Be a Force**. But as Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. taught us, true progress is never the result of one person's brilliance—it is the result of a community's courage. In this high-impact, interactive workshop, Dr. Shakenna Williams invites the Bentley community to move beyond nostalgia and into movement.

Drawing from her acclaimed work and book, ***Hooked***, Dr. Williams will lead faculty, students, staff, and alumni through a necessary conversation about the "hooks" that hold us back: perfectionism, silence, and the exhaustion of navigating systems not designed for us. Participants will explore the **F.O.R.C.E.** framework—a strategy to transform hope from a passive feeling into a cognitive power tool for leadership.

This is not a traditional keynote; it is a collaborative laboratory for collective action. Through personal reflection and group "linkage" exercises, attendees will learn how to:

- **Unhook** from limiting narratives that drain individual and communal hope.
- **Scale Purpose** by shifting focus from individual outcomes to collective impact.
- **Activate Linkage** by moving from simple connection to intentional, accountable commitment to one another.

Join us to honor Dr. King's mandate to show up, speak up, and link up. Together, we will imagine—and begin to build—a world where our achievement is not just measured by what we do, but by who we become as a collective force.
