In the decades since the reemergence of neoliberal economics in the 1980s, wealth inequality has grown and widespread degradation, including the total collapse of life-sustaining ecosystems has accelerated. In response, the concept of the Triple Bottom Line was developed by John Elkington, and suggests that corporations be managed in a way that benefits society, the environment, and corporate shareholders. Although appealing, the concept is flawed both in concept and execution. This discussion will explore why people, planet and profit should not be given equal weight when evaluating corporate performance, and why current management systems are inadequate to address social and environmental issues.
