

PRIDE Holidays and Memorial Days

Summer

- June: Pride Month
 - PRIDE partners with community members across campus to put on a series of events that celebrate the LGBTQ community. Past events include a Progress flag raising on campus, workshops on the history of LGBTQ activism, and social media campaigns for LGBTQ books, music, and movies.

Fall

 - PRIDE celebrates Coming Out Day through an annual event intended to challenge our community's assumptions about LGBTQ people and stereotypes surrounding being a member of this community.

 - PRIDE partners with GSSP and ODI to hold a memorial for those lost to transphobic violence, and to educate the community on gender identity and gender presentation.

Spring

 - PRIDE highlights the contributions of Black queer people to the LGBTQ community on social media, and collaborates with campus partners on events to celebrate and educate the Bentley community around race, gender, and sexuality.

 - PRIDE honors this day through a program where people can write down the labels they claim and the labels placed upon them by society based on gender, race, sexual orientation, gender expression, culture, religion, and other attributes. This is an opportunity to bring awareness to the ways that you are labelled and take a step towards ending discrimination.

 - PRIDE partners with GSSP and ODI to educate the community on gender identity and gender presentation, and to celebrate the impact of transgender people in the LGBTQ community.
